WHY USE INDUSTRY STANDARD CHAREPONES AND TUTOES



We look to encourage a balance between a council's expectations for a chaperone and tutor and the practicality of meeting industry standards

- · Whilst ambassadors for the local authorities they are licensed to, chaperones
- should work proactively with a production to pre-empt any issues.

 They ensure productions remain regulatory compliant and monitor best practise
- Safeguarding is everyones responsibility and Chaperones are part of production's
- Check Chaperones licence/ Safeguarding Certificate/ Chaperone training certificate/ Enhanced DRS on the undate service

OFCOM CODE

Rule 1 28

"Flue care must be taken over the obvoical and emotional welfare and the dignity of people under eighteen who take part or are otherwise involved in programmes. This is irrespective of any consent given by the participant or by a parent, guardian or other person over the age of eighteen in loco parentis"

Bulo 1 20:

"People under eighteen must not be caused unnecessary distress or anxiety by their involvement in programmes or by the broadcast of those programmes"





EXPLORING IN LOCO PARENTIS

- Regulations state that chaperones should be acting in loco parentis. As all parents differ in the way they choose to bring up their children this is difficult at times.
- Sometimes a parent would make a judgement call that a chaperone should not and would not allow such as allowing a child to go to the bathroom unaccompanied.



LEGALITIES OF THE CHILD LICENCE ADDITICATION EODM

- Part 1 of the licence application form is for production to complete.
- · Part 2 is for the parents. . Ensuring all regulatory compliance is then the legal responsibility of the person who
- signs the licence application form. By naming the parent as the chaperone, production have agreed to the council that
- the parent is able to cover all regulatory compliance.
 - If the parent is not a registered licensed chaperone then this falls to the signatory of the licence application form.
- . Engaging a licensed chaperone to accompany a parent will support the terms of your licence and proactively mitigate your risks prior to and during council soot checks



TYPES OF CHILD LICENCES AND EXEMPTIONS

 Child licence application – working on licensed premises / receiving payment either directly or via third party/gifts / absent . Body of paragraph - multi har used for filming large groups of children where no time off arbord is negligible or neumant hains

 4 Day Rule Exemption Certificate – if a child has not performed on more than 3 days in the last 6 months, they will not need a licence for cerformance on a fourth day provided the child is not absent from school/ beins paid apart from expenses/ not

· Unscripted/ Ob Opps/Factual - usually licensed

International licensins - is granted by a Magistrates court

NS: You must apply to the council for any of the above in advance apart from international Child Licences

CHOOSING VOLID TLITOR

The regulations state it is the responsibility of the license holder to ensure that someone suitable is engaged. Councils will request their teaching certificates.

- Differences between a tutor and a teacher:
 Tutoring is not regulated teaching is.
- Enhanced DBS check on the update service
- Teaching certificates
- QTS certificates



AGGREGATING TUTOR HOURS

- Create blocks made up of 1, 2, 3, or 4
 weeks but not on more than 4
- Bank holidays
- 15 hours per week
- Minimum of 6 per week
- No less than 3D mins per session
- Take your total hours and divide by how many working days to average your daily expected hours to help you stay on target and schedule hours in advance

REGULATED ACTIVITY

- Only the chaperone and/or tutor are performing a regulated activity, requiring an enhanced DBS with children's barred list check.
- Crew with direct contact with a child, for example, costume, make-up, and sound, are not performing a regulated activity and as such production cannot complete the same level of

This highlights the need for safeguarding policies and practice to be fit for ouroose.

SAFEGUARDING OUR YOUNG ARTIST 16-18's

- In the eyes of the law 'children' refers to anyone who has not reached their 18th birthday. Safeguarding remains a productions responsibility.
- Have you considered creating an appropriate Code of Conduct for this age group and employing a YPC (Young Person Chaperone) to support safeguarding both the young person and all production crew at work?
- Who is recording the monitoring of their wellbeing at every stage of the production process?



Working with IC's and chaperones
